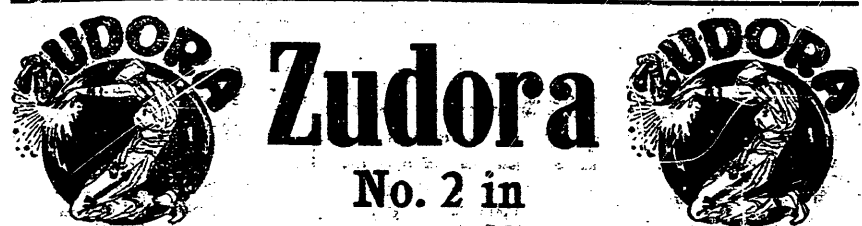


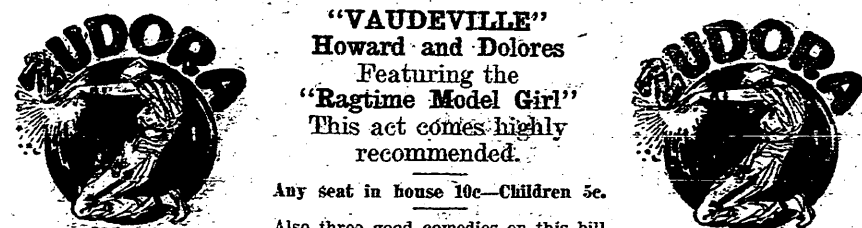

RIVERSIDE POLOISTS BEAT MIDWICK

Playing Under the Colors of Coronado Local Men Roll Up Score of 14 to 3 Against Crack Midwick Four; Drury and Reggie Weiss Each Make Five Goals.

SAN DIEGO, Jan. 2.—The story of yesterday's polo game can be told in three words—Drury, Weiss brothers, Hugh Drury, the typical Kipling polo hero at Riverside, who is known wherever polo is played, has been working out with Harry and Reggie Weiss the last two months, and with J. Langford Stack, the Chicago wonder, were unbeatable; in fact they played all around the so-called Midwicks, made up of eastern and coast players amused to working together.

If Bobbie Neustadt had been at No. 1 with that jolly bay pony which played the game so cleverly last year, instead of Walter Dupree, who was drafted in at the last moment, there would have been more evenness in the playing. The lineup: Coronado—No. 1, Harry Weiss; No. 2, Reggie Weiss; No. 3, Hugh Drury; No. 4, J. Langford Stack. Midwick—No. 1, W. H. Dupree; No. 2, Thomas Le Boutillier; No. 3, Perry Beadleston; No. 4, Carleton Burke. In the first period the Coronado team scored five times in succession and seemed to have things their own way, but Beadleston, the New York man, soon found himself and often stopped the ball when Hugh Drury had made one of those savage drives, and Reggie Weiss had carried the ball almost across.

She does not want him silly in front of people, but she does want him courteous to her. Isn't it right that he should be?"

Right that he should be, little girl, of course it is. A thousand times right. When a good man loves a good woman he has no reason to be ashamed of the fact. On the contrary, he should be proud to let the world know it by his attitude towards her. And by that, I mean by his courtesy and his manner of restrained tenderness, not by public caresses.

Public Caresses in Bad Taste
As you say, they are silly. They are in bad taste too. The well-bred man does not caress his fiancée in public; the well-bred girl is not forever hovering over her fiancée, or asserting her ownership by picking a thread from his sleeve or straightening his tie. Perhaps the young man of the letter intensely dislikes this sort of thing and tries to show his distaste by flying off on the opposite tangent, by affecting coldness and indifference in the presence of others.
